


A Farewell to JEAN MAURICE BONNEAU

This period saw the Brazilian team compete in prestigious events like the 2011 and 2015 Pan American Games, the 2012 London Olympics, and the 2014 World Cup.

Furthermore, he was the personal trainer of Kevin Staut and Philippe Rozier at the Olympic Games in 2016.

Moreover, **Bonneau's** passion for sharing his knowledge led him to author the book «**On Y sera un Jour**, **Mon Grand**» offering invaluable insights and experiences from his illustrious career.
