


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






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MANAL AL ASSAD

Syrian Arab Equestrian Federation Honourary President: First place winner of the M100 Dressage event & Second place winner of the M200 event:

ON DRESSAGE: "dressage is new in Syria and I took the initiative to start it because I wanted its idea to expand here after seeing show jumping move further. Endurance and show jumping have grown in Arab countries so why not dressage? It's an Olympic discipline, it's elegant and it's good for the sport. My participation was not because I wanted or deserved a win, I just sought to see how my training came in because I just started in July 2007. I really thank the judges for honouring me with a win which really gave me a push to continue on training in order to reach higher levels. I also wanted to give an indication to other Arab countries that Syria is really pushing to build-up dressage in the Middle East with specialised dressage horses and trainers helping to encourage them to really specialise in the discipline; if there is competition all around the area, then it will absolutely grow. Arab show jumpers have reached the World Cup and the Olympics, and I hope Arab dressage riders will as well".


ON TRAINERS: "I have had two trainers for dressage; firstly I was trained by Pia Johansson from Schockemohle stables and then I continued with Paulo Margi from Italy who has had great history in dressage. He helped me a lot in gaining experience. I am also going to try training with a third trainer because varying trainers helps in adding to one's experience and details of perfection".

This is a brilliant riding centre and the competition levels are high enough for me to see future shows just like the ones in Europe; the grounds are perfect and the future of dressage has excellent potential in the Middle East".





ON FRIDAY MARCH 21ST, a party hosted by the young and beautiful Lebanese singer Nancy Ajram and the talented Syrian poet Sabah Fakhri was held. No more boots and dust at the party, but elegant gowns and suits worn by everyone coming to participate at the 2008 events.

AFTER TWO DAYS of dressage events and entertaining freestyle dressage by Manal Al Assad, a day off was taken for further preparations for the show jumping events.

MOST of the riders inhabited Yafour Hotel & Resort at Yafour – located opposite the new eight Gate of Damscus Emmar Project, Syria. It was easy to lounge with the riders and get a feel of how well they were prepared for the show. Yafour hotel is not as busy all year round, so the hospitality, convenience, and hosting was quite pleasant. It was a little far from Bassel Al Assad Equestrian Club, but was close enough for a drive-by peek at the beautiful mountains dwelling on the country side of Al Sham (Levant – Syria).

With more than 250 riders and horses competing for Al Bassel Memorial Trophy, the show jumping competitions

kicked-off to a very competitive start and ended with much anxiety for the Syrian crowd watching their local riders compete, as well as unexpected, yet wonderful surprises.

ON SUNDAY MARCH 23RD, a loud acrobatic Opening Ceremony with fireworks welcomed 12 countries on Syrian grounds to participate in the event; Jordan, Germany, the UAE, Italy, Turkey, KSA, Iraq, Qatar, Kuwait, Lebanon, Egypt, Yemen and with the host Syria.

COMPETITIONS started with children at 8 am and would continue with Small, Medium and Big tours until 10 pm. On the Childrens Level, the First place win went to Syria's Yousif Anzarouti with a total points of 148 throughout the 4 day event, the Second place win went to Jordan's Taj Al-Deen Barakat with a total points of 142, and the Third win went to Laith Al Shibli, also from Syria, with a total points of 137.

ROB JANSEN

International Course Designer:

"The courses at Seif Al Sham (CSIO-W/3*), the outdoor show jumping event just before Al Wafaa (CSI-W/4*) indoor event, were not too difficult and big because the horses had to jump again in 8 days; if the courses were too big for them in the first show, they wouldn't have jumped well in this indoor arena. Furthermore, the preparations are not yet ready for Al Wafaa courses; when I'm in the arena I get the feeling of how to plan a course, seeing the horses also helps me with the design, so I always wait until the last moment to plan the courses".

ON THE SENIOR LEVEL, some riders would compete with 2 horses in Small and Medium tours but would stick to that and allow the more professional to jump the Big courses. Riders would work their horses before the show in a wide outdoor arena, and then straddle-up in their outfits to perform indoors. With the audience seated very closely to the courses, every time a Syrian rider gallops in with his beautiful horse, the crowd would roar in applause. Quite a very popular rider there was the 2007 Grand Prix winner Saudi's Khalid Al Eid who everyone would watch in complete silence. On each and every day of the 4 day event, dangerous nasty falls would be seen on the arena. The horses were still unaccustomed to the indoor conditions and mischief would be seen through their eyes.

THE FIRST DAY SMALL TOUR (1.20M) ON SUNDAY MARCH 23RD was won by Salim Ahmed Al Suwaidi from the UAE. Second came in Ali Al Khorafi from Kuwait, and Third came in Ibrahim Bisharat from Jordan. The Medium Tour (1.35m) First place win went to the rising skilled Yemeni rider Bassim Hassan Seif, Second place went to Qatari Sheikh Ali bin Khalid Al Thani, and the Third place went to Egyptian/Italian Andre Sakakini. Ending the day with the Big Tour (1.40m), the 3 wins went to gutsy Ahmad Hamsho from Syria First, Khalid Al Eid Second, and once again, Ibrahim Bisharat Third.



MONDAY MARCH 24TH tours and more anxiety was in the air. Most of the riders were competing to pull-off points in order to qualify for the World Cup. The Small Tour (1.20m) First place win went to Nael Nassar, Second place to Saudi's Moshari Al Harbi, and Third place to Sheikh Shakbout Al Nahayan from the UAE. On The Medium Tour Level (1.35m), Abdullah Humaid Al Muhairi came in First place; Egypt's Karim El Zoghby came in Second, and Ahmed Tolba at Third place. Finally, the Big Tour (Qualifier for the FEI World Cup 1.40m) First place win went to Karim El Zoghby again, Second place win went to Shadi Ghrayb, and Third place to Ibrahim Bisharat. Fadi Al Zbibi was leading the World Qualifier and his home crowd was expecting a lot from him. Applause and enthusiasm wera all over the arena each and every time he rode at the diverse tours. That day, he was riding smoothly, jumping clear on his horse Tyson and just at the last the Oxer, the crowd cheered loudly and Tyson jumped up and landed in the middle of the Oxer, then collapsed to throw Fadi over; thankfully the heavens intervened with the pair of them rising to the louder applause from the crowd.



"The show is very strong because we see the best riders and horses competing. All the riders are interested in competing here because the organising committee always tries its best to present a really good show. If we look at the prize money this year, we'll see the highest in all the shows Syria has had before. The grounds are perfect, and the arena is great. "The show has been good; the horses jumped outdoors a week ago and now they are indoors so they are a little disoriented. The organisation and footing is excellent, and this League is the second fastest growing league in the world so I think the sport is growing and all countries want to compete and present their best riders; that is good for the sport. TUESDAY MARCH 25TH saw a Consolation day with competitions that included an Accumulator with Joker Small Tour, Top Score Competition Medium Tour, and Accumulator with Joker Big Tour. Small Tour wins went to Ahmed Mansour (First), Kuwait's Zaid Al Marzouq (Second) and Saudi's Abdulrahman Al Hamzani (Third). Top Score Medium Tour wins went to Ahmad Hamsho (First), Egypt's Mohamed Osama El Boraei (Second) and once again, Zaid Al Marzouq (Third). With the day ending, the Accumulator with Big Tour wins went to Nassouh Khayyali (First), the UAE's Hamad Al Kirbi (Second) and also from the UAE - Arif Ahmed (Third).

IT'S THE FINAL DAY OF AL WAFAA 2008 EVENT WEDNESDAY MARCH 26TH. The best Arab riders would perform to display skill and containment of nerves. The Syrian Arab Equestrian Federation Honourary President Manal Al Assad would usually be sitting in the VIP lounge but today she was sitting in the midst of the audience, walking up and down the stairs – excited to see great performances from riders from 12 countries.


THE SMALL TOUR (1.25M) GRAND PRIX winner was Egypt's Nael Nassar again in a display of young and talented riding. The Second place winner was Sheikh Shakhbout Al Nahayan and the Third place winner was Aisha Al Qaoud from Kuwait.

SHEIKH SHAKHBOUT AL NAHAYAN

Small Tour Grand Prix Second place winner:

"This is my first time in Syria and the classes have been very difficult. The organisation is great and the judges have been very nice to the riders; they communicate professionally with riders these days and I am happy with this progress in show jumping. There are so many riders here which mean that show jumping is very important in Syria. If the show stays at this rate, the Olympic Federation would probably allow more international shows to be held in Syria, and of course, the more shows, the better for us riders. The sport is developing very fast in the Arab world and years ago the courses were not very big and we never saw a lot of riders. However, today riders go to Europe to receive more quality training and buy excellent horses which makes me see special riders participating here".

THE MINI GRAND PRIX (1.35m) winner was Karim El Zoghby, Second came in Khalid Al Eid, and Third Andre Sakakini after an electrifying 45 second jump-off between them and Ibrahim Bisharat, Egyptians Dr. Sameh Hattab and Ahmed Bassiouni, and Qatar's Ali Al Rumaihi.

KARIM EL ZOGHBY

Beijing 2008 Olympic qualifier, March 24th Medium Tour Second place winner, March 24th Big Tour First place winner & Mini Grand Prix First place winner:

"The show has been disastrous for me (Laughing)!! No! This is the first time I participate here; I am very happy and the atmosphere is great. It's nice to have indoor shows in the Middle East and I am also happy that the organisers allowed plenty of Egyptian riders to participate and gain experience, thus I think other shows should do the same. A lot of Egyptian need to leave Egypt to gain experience and become better elsewhere. Every time I come to the Middle East, I see that it's getting better and better in show jumping...riders are spending more money on their horses which is notable. It's no longer about buying the horse, but it's about training yourself to ride the horse which is very important. I don't have expectations for myself in the upcoming days, but I am hoping that Mohamed Osama El Boraie comes out with another win because he is really competing to gain points for the World Cup, and I wish everyone else the best of luck".

ON PREPARATIONS FOR THE 2008 BEIJING OLYMPICS: "I qualified with 2 horses for the Olympics; one of them is a really good horse but lacks a little experience and I am hoping to test him during the Global Champions Tour in Qatar. The other one has been to big shows and I think he is ready. I am very lucky to be going to the Olympics with 2 horses; I have 10 big shows to attend before which will add to the clarity of matters and I am also trying my best in preparations".

ANDRE SAKAKINI

March 23rd Medium & Big Tour Third place winner, March 24th Big Tour Third place winner, Mini Grand Prix Fifth place winner:

"We do not see a lot of clear rounds because all the riders just came from competing in an outdoor event to compete in an indoor one where the horses are not really relaxed and are not using their bodies in the best way. All the horses are surprised but I think all the riders are well prepared; I think we will see a lot of surprises during the Grand Prix. I feel good about my win and I am happy with my horses because they both jumped well and showed excellent performance".

IBRAHIM BISHARAT

Beijing 2008 Olympic qualifier & March 23rd Big Tour Third place winner:

"This is a very nice show; I've been participating for several years and I am always glad to be here. I've been performing well in the competitions and I hope I continue to do so during the

Grand Prix. It's nearly the end of the season and a lot of riders have gained experience; the levels of competition are quite high and to win a class, the rider and the horse have to be very competitive".

ON SHOW JUMPING DEVELOPING IN THE MIDDLE EAST & HIS PREPARATIONS FOR THE 2008 BEIJING OLYMPICS: "the show jumping sport in this region is on the right track these days. 2 years ago they started the Arab League and now the shows are becoming bigger in several Arab countries. It's only a matter of time and training and then we will see better levels. I have been trying to prepare for the Olympics; the horses that go with me are inexperienced but they have been improving".

IT IS 6 PM AND AL WAFAA GRAND PRIX riders are set and ready. 26 qualified riders are wondering what could be the big surprise of the show and 12 of whom qualified for the jump-offs. Syria's National Champion Shadi Ghrayb was all clear round on his magnificent horse Sham 7 until a cameraman from the midst of the silent concentrated crowd interfered with a loud "Go Go Go"; an unfortunate refusal by Sham 7, a crash to the final course and a harsh tumble off the horse by Shadi saw the National Champion out of the qualifications to the Grand Prix jump-offs. Disappointment was everywhere but 3 Syrians, Tareq Arnaout, Fadi Al Zbibi and Wassim Anzarouti along with the UAE's Mohamed Al Owais and Abdullah Al Marri, Egypt's Diaa Omar Bashir, Ibrahim Sami, and Karim El Zoghby, Kuwait's Ali Al Khorafi, Jordan's Ibrahim Bisharat, Qatar's Ali Al Rumahi and finally, the 2007 winner Saudi's Khalid Al Eid would see the 2008 competitions to an end. More silence, concentration from the audience and highly competitive riding from 3 talented riders led to 3 wins: First place to Abdullah Al Marri, Second place to Khalid Al Eid, and Third to Tareq Arnaout.

The Fourth place win went to Ibrahim Bisharat, Fifth to Karim El Zoghby, Sixth to Diaa Omar Bashir, Seventh to Ali Al Khorafi, Eighth to Wassim Anzarouti, Ninth to Mohamed Al Owais, Tenth to Fadi Al Zbibi, Eleventh to Ibrahim Sami and Twelfth to Ali Al Rumaihi.



ABDULLAH AL MARRI Grand Prix First place winner:


"This is my first indoor event with my mare that has helped me qualify for the World Cup; it's a matter of schooling and teaching her the contents of competing indoors hoping that she gets a feel of how the arena is like - with her also seeing the audience up close. She needs to be concentrating on the fences in order to complete her job, hence it was very rewarding for me to compete here. The first time I competed in the Arab League was last year and the level of competition is getting better and better, and given the calibre of the riders competing here, I wasn't sure who will qualify for the World Cup because it was a close call! The levels were quite high and I am sure within the next year they will get better. I am not sure yet that we have reached the levels of competition that we see in Europe, but the Arab League is growing bigger, we are competing against fellow Arabs and I know we will be able to compete against everyone else in the near future".

ON HIS WIN: "this is the best career win I have ever had in my entire young career (ecstatically smiling)! When I first rode I was just seventeen years old, now I'm twenty-four and this is a huge achievement for me. I am blessed to have a really good horse, I am lucky to have a very good trainer, and I am happy to also have a good sponsor, the Dubai Equestrian Club, which has been supporting us throughout the tour. And with the awareness of HRH Sheikh Mohamed bin Rashid Al Maktoum and his wife HRH Princess Haya bint Al Hussein whom both know the sport very well, I am thankful to reach such a huge path in my career. They started this team 3 years ago and we have already achieved so much - winning something is the only way we can say thank you to them".

TAREQ ARNAOUT Grand Prix Third place winner:

"The Grand Prix is the most important competition amongst all others; every rider is looking to win Al Bassel Memorial Trophy and it surely isn't easy. Throughout the past days I saw a lot of surprises in the Medium and Big tours, but here in Syria, even though we are under a lot of pressure to win, we only wish that the best Arab riders win, no matter what country they come from. To add to the excitement of the show, the courses were very technical and big for the qualifications; we all saw quite cruel falls and lady luck was not on the side of many professional riders this year. This indoor arena, with the audience seated so closely to the courses, is not an easy location for jumping. 2 years ago, a rider with 4 faults would win, but this year, a rider that has a clear round but with bad timing has no chance of winning any classes. This shows that show jumping is reaching higher levels helping us in having the ability to qualify for more international shows".






WASSIM ANZAROUTI

Grand Prix Eighth place winner:

"I love this show very much and we as Syrians work so hard to compete here. I have had good results that helped me qualify for the Grand Prix with my young horse that's only competing at his second Grand Prix. As I assumed, all the riders and their horses are trying their best to compete at this show; it's an important 4 star show with a lot of prize money. There are around 250 horses competing on daily basis throughout this event and it's very hard to keep up the riding levels. Besides, the very good step that the Arab League has taken was helping riders compete throughout the year in different shows, but shows have to be early in the year so we can have enough time to qualify for the World Cup and as a consequence also add to our development further".

"The show has been very intriguing with all the riders and horses that I see! The competitions are very tough; it's still always good to see Egypt competing with all these very experienced horses and different budgets paid for them of course! 



Um ayyad Spain

WHO ARE THEY THAT WILL MOURN AFTER MY DEATH? MY SW ORD, MY LANCE AND MY LEAN, LONG LEGGED CHESTNUT, TRALING HIS REINS TO THE FOUNTAIN, DEATH HAVING CARRIED OFF HIS RIDER - ARAB POET

> During Arab conquests and the spread of Islam, the relationship between warrior and horse has been described in many versus of the Quran, in poems, and literary works. A bright period for the Islamic Empire was during the Umayyad rule which had the empire extend to the Iberian Peninsula. Seven hundred years before Columbus set sail for the New World, the Moors


invaded and conquered the Iberian Peninsula. With them the Moors (common term to refer to the Muslims of Islamic Iberian Peninsula and North Africa. who were of Arab and Berber descent) brought Arabian and Berber horses (known as Barbs).These exceptional horses were more than a little

history of their masters.

Spain was under Muslim Reign for over 800 years from 711 - 1422 AD. The exceptional horses have not been all what the Muslim Empire contributed to Spain; the Moors built magnificent cities as well.

Education was universal in Moorish Spain, available to the most humble, while 99% of Europe was illiterate - not even the kings could read or write. In the tenth and eleventh centuries, public libraries did not exist in Europe, while Moorish Spain had more than seventy, of which the one in Cordova contained over six hundred thousand manuscripts. There were more than seventeen great universities in Moorish Spain, while Europe had only two universities of any

Scientific progress in astronomy, chemistry, geography, mathematics, physics, and philosophy flourished in Moorish Spain. Scholars, artist and scientists formed learning societies, while

scientific congresses were organised to promote research and to facilitate the spread of knowledge. A brisk intellectual life flourished in all Islamic dominated societies.

Architecture was splendour during Muslim Rule as exemplified in The Mezquita De Cordova which is now the Roman Catholic Church in Cordova. The Mezquita represents two worlds, two cultures that are exquisitely combined in it.

This historical encounter will explore the era of El Mezquita highlighting a personal close up with the founder of the Mezquita and the dynamics of Umayyad Spain. The Mezquita, meaning the mosque dates back to the 8th century. It was built in Cordova the capital of Muslim Spain. The construction of the Mezquita started in approximately sixth century A.D. as a Christian Visigothic church. Later, the Mezquita was reworked for over two centuries to refashion it as a mosque, starting in 786 A.D. under the supervision

of the first Muslim Emir Abd ar-Rahman I, who used it as an adjunct to his palace and named it to honour his wife.

The founder of the mosque Abd ar-Rahman I was known as the "Falcon of Andalus" or "The Falcon of Quraish" for he was the founder of the Muslim dynasty that ruled the greater part of Iberia for nearly three centuries. Abd ar-Rahman's establishment of a government in Andalus presented a break from the rest of the Islamic Empire, which was ruled by the Abbasidsia. But that materialised through this great leader's political shrewdness and wisdom. Descending from an Umayyad Ancestry Abd ar-Rahman was the grandson of Hisham ibn Abd al-Malik, the tenth Umayyad Caliph. Abd ar-Rahman was a prince groomed from an early age to be a caliph.

A 749 A.D. Abbasid revolution overthrew the young princes' ruling family in Damascus and he, along with other family members, fled the city. His journey to his fateful Andalusia had started at that point, and this journey, which was faced with many adversaries and plenty of Abbasid trials of assassination of the Prince, was a great test for the Emir who traveled through many countries until he finally reached Morocco in year 755AD. It was from Morocco that Abd ar-Rahman sent his envoy to claim rightful authority over Andalusia.

Greeted by many loyalists, Abd ar-Rahman made his way through Andalusia. Waves of people made their way to Malaga to pay respect to the prince they thought was dead. One famous story which persisted through history related



to a gift Abd ar-Rahman was given while in Malaga. The gift was a beautiful young slave girl, but Abd ar-Rahman humbly returned her to her previous master while saying, "I will not indulge in any distraction, be it of sight or of the heart, until Spain is within my grasp".

It was not all that of a simple conquest for the Emir, Cordova's then current Ummayad Governor, Yusuf Al-Fihri, was not going to give up his right to rule Andalusia without a fight.

Even before the fight began, dissension spread through some of Abd ar-Rahman's lines. Specifically, the Yemeni Arabs were unhappy that the prince was mounted on a fine Spanish steed. The Yemenis scoffed that such a fine horse would provide an excellent escape vehicle from the battle. Being the ever-wary politician,

Abd ar-Rahman acted quickly to regain Yemeni support, and rode to a Yemeni chief who was mounted on a mule.

Abd ar-Rahman said that his horse proved difficult to ride, and offered to exchange his horse for the mule, a deal which the surprised chief took advantage of. A possible Yemeni rebellion was stopped with the swap. The mule's name was 'Lightning'. Soon both armies were in their lines on

Abd ar-Rahman is faced with

a huge Abbasid army.
Allegedly he tells his army
of 700 soldiers "today we
conquer or we die." His

leaves most of the
Abbasid army killed and
earns him the respect of his
enemy the Abbasid Caliph of
Baghdad Al-Mansour.

After the aforementioned period of conflict, Abd ar-Rahman continued in his improvement of Andalusia's infrastructure. to the Caliph's palace by a raised walkway. Also the double arches were a new introduction to architecture, and helped support the tremendous weight of the higher ceilings. Other Caliphs came to complete what Abd ar-Rahman had





victory, and the field was strewn with the bodies of the enemy." Rising from his defeat Al-Fihri gathered himself again with an army of 20,000 captivated souls. Abd ar-Rahman defeated the army in small battles and finally Al-Fihri was captured and killed. Al-Fihri's head was sent to Cordova, where Abd ar-Rahman had it nailed to a bridge. With this act, Abd ar-Rahman proclaimed himself the Emir of Andalusia.

That was the time when many of Abd ar-Rahman's relatives flocked from exile to live in Andalusia as it represented a safe haven for the crushed and exiled Umayyads. The long sought after peace would not continue for long. Al-Mansour, the Abbasid Caliph in Baghdad had long He ensured roadways were begun, aqueducts were constructed or improved, and that a new mosque was well funded in his capital at Cordova. Construction on the mosque started around the year 786. It would in time become world famous and deemed a major holy site for many Muslims; later to be known as the Mezquita de Cordova.

The mosque was famous for the 1 000 pillars made of jade, onyx, marble, and granite that were adorned in the prayer room. It is said that Abd ar-Rahman oriented the Mihrab southward as if he were still in the Umayyad capital of Damascus. The mosque was connected

started. Caliph Al-Hakeem II enriched the Mihrab and its magnificent antechamber in 961. Later it was concluded that the Mihrab was and still is a "masterpiece of architectural art". Abd ar-Rahman III ordered a new minaret. The Mezquita reached its current dimensions in 987 with the completion of the outer naves and orange tree courtyard.

However when the city was later conquered by King Ferdinand III in 1236, the mosque was reconstructed into a Christian church with only 850 pillars remaining. Two religions, two cultures, and two dynasties extended from the Mezquita of Cordova. HT





THE HORSE INDUSTRY

IN CHINA



Shanghai - China is a scintillating city swirling with rapid cultural changes - a poised area that has fully found its stance of art relics and contemporary beauty in the past few years. Modern Shanghai only began to emerge 160 years ago - its story is that of worldly transformation since the spoils of British victory in the first Opium war, and the ultra-left base for Madam Mao during the Cultural Revolution.

China has a rapid economic growth that surpassed world expectations since the beginning of the economic reform in 1978. This has reflected on Shanghai which has witnessed marked progresses in its social and economic development and stands today as the largest economic and transportation centre in China. Now, the city is striving to turn itself into one of the economic, financial, trade and transportation centres in the world. According to the Canadian Arabian Horse Registry, China also has the largest amount of horses in the world, but has only held a long and advanced horse culture in the recent century. Modern horse industry has transformed from traditional service into horse racing, performance display, horse commercial biotech, and horse-riding entertainment.

Late last year, Horse Times attended the first Horse Trade Fair held in Shanghai and met with Mr. He Jianping, Manager of the Trade Fair to explore China's boom not only in economy but in the equestrian sport. Horse Times has also met with Mr. James Sun, the GM of Golden Horse — a Chinese horse portal, to deliver its readers a closer encounter with the horse industry's growth in the world's most populated country.

It was apparent from the fair visitors that the potential horse industry market is at large, infiltrated with prospective horse lovers. HT asked Mr. Sun if the sport is affordable to be enjoyed by all. "There are horse lovers who do not have enough economy power to support the sport. Those people of-course have their way of enjoying the sport, such as in leisure riding. The rich buy good horses from Europe and the Middle East." Mr. Sun added "the horse in China has ancient history. Agriculturally speaking, the Chinese always used the horse, but for sports, it's still being established, especially with the development of the economy. We are still learning. Many people have been attending small exhibitions to learn more about the sport."

Flourishing the grounds for the equestrian

world, Mr. Jianping said that the aim of the exhibition is to have the sport as well as the business of the horse grow wider all over the world. He added: "We seek international experts from the horse business to meet here in China, to promote the horse and the sport."

In a perpetually thriving country, the future of the horse industry is considered a bright one to play around. "The market will expand fully in the future with all this. I do sincerely believe that since 2004, things have been growing and I am sure it will continue because it's an existing market," claimed Mr. Sun whose website horsemanship, aims to develop the concepts of horses in China - focusing on all equestrian sports.

On reaching out for the outside world HT Asked Mr. Jianping on the efforts exerted in that direction, other than the trade fair, to which he replied that: "we hope to corporate with the international media abroad that can help the industry to be more familiar to the outside world."

On a promising note Mr. Jianping concluded that the success of this fair has encouraged the Chinese people to hold a second exhibition in China. HT

Q & A

with Gen. TAREK YOUSRY

Assistant to the Minister of Interior President of the Police Academy

When was the first time you rode a horse?

I started at quite a young age at the Alexandria Sporting Club, and some of the new rising stars were Andre Sakakini and Tarek Kabbani Hammad. At the end of the 50's, Andre was five years old and I was ten. I continued riding while I was in university, along with Dr. Hisham Sadek who was in charge of the riding team at the University of Alexandria back then.

What has riding, or dealing with a horse, taught you in life?

Horses are smart and physically strong creatures that have lots of pride. They have taught me patience and the ability to face obstacles; while working with a horse one develops very special communication skills, you realise that words are just one form of communication amongst many more. You learn to respect this animal who could give you so much only if he feels that bond between him and his rider.

Which riders have left special impressions on you?

Gen. Gamal Harris was someone who left a very special impression on me; he is a very honourable man and a very special rider. He is the prefect example of a genuine horseman.

In what way did Gen. Gamal Harris affect your riding?

Gen. Harris proved to me that nothing is impossible. If the rider insists on achieving his goals then he will, he just has to be persistent enough to learn well and realise that learning and practise will lead to success. He also taught me how to be gentle with the horse because harmony is the key to perfection; riding is a continuous dialogue with the horse through ones hands, seat and legs - and riding is about refining this symphony everyday.

How do you see show jumping developing within the police force?

I hope the police sports union recovers its prestigious and glorious history in show jumping. When we were young, horses were more exclusive to the army forces and the police. There were limited numbers of horses available and the expenditures for maintaining them were high. Not a lot of civilians were able to get into such a sport due to its high expense; top competition was mostly between military ranked individuals and police officers. Currently, just like everything changes, civilians are replacing military personnel and I still hope to see some change within the police academy again so we can witness potential champions that in return could represent our image. If we take previous Olympic participations, we saw riders such as Gen. Gamal Harris, Gen. Elwy Ghazy, and Ahmed Mazhar who were

not civilians. The scenario has changed now; we have national and international tours with much higher participations from civilians and very few officers.

In what way do you see that the equestrian sport has changed?

There has been a change worldwide; sponsoring companies and firms have come into the sport and put in a lot of money so riding has become a profession. It is not just a sport anymore, it is an industry. Moreover, it is not simple to assess if that change is in the best interest of the sport; after all, we are teaching our children about honour, horsemanship, and bravery versus an industry that circulates around money. Well, I suppose a regulated mixture of the two might turn out to be beneficial for the time being.

Does your son ride?

Yes he does, and believe it or not Sherif is a civilian. He has inherited the passion from me and competed in various tournaments, but he currently works abroad.

What can you tell us about your daily routine?

I leave home to the Ferousia club at the academy, and I start my day with riding. If my day doesn't start with that, then it probably won't be a great day! Riding helps me relax and takes away any residual stress within, which in return helps me become more tolerant during my day. HT



TURN ON THE HAUNCHES

In the turn on the haunches, the horse
- at the walk, pivots around his inner hind
leg while his other legs describe a larger
concentric circle. It demands not only
an accurate and sensitive
combination of the aids by the
rider but also a high standard of
training from the horse. If he has
too much weight on his forehand, he will
find it very difficult to perform the turn
correctly and require further schooling.

Although the exercise is eventually performed from the halt, it is often easier to start the turn from a walk so that you have the benefit of natural impulsion. The horse's pivoting hind leg can move forward a little - making a small circle, but should never move backwards. After the first few steps of the turn, the horse reaches the point where his inside hind foot twists awkwardly and he must pick it up and replace it in its natural position. You have to anticipate by feel whether he will put his foot down again in the same spot or whether you must prevent him from wandering. It is this element that makes the turn a difficult exercise for less experienced riders.

If you use your leg aids too strongly, or


fail to contain the horse with your hands, he will move forwards instead of sideways, while the reverse of this is a worst fault, as he will move backwards. As with the turn on the forehand, do not repeat the exercise too often, and get satisfied, while learning, with a few well executed steps rather than a full 180 turn.

You will find it easier at first to use a wall or fence to guide you. Later you can practice from the halt and, finally, you can try the same exercise in the open, without guiding fence or wall. You will then have laid a sound foundation for future lateral work at more advanced level.


AIDS FOR THE TURN ON THE HAUNCHES:

Halt the horse straight and then apply a warning half-halt, while maintaining light contact with your hands. Flex your horse slightly in the direction you wish him to turn. To pivot right, on the offside hind foot, remain upright in the saddle, with your shoulders square to the horse. Your outside leg will be behind the girth, to control the hindquarters, maintain impulsion, and ask for the turn around the inside leg. Your inside leg should stay against the horse's side to keep the horse up to the bit and in position, and to prevent him from stepping backwards, as well as to limit sideways movement. Your inside rein leads the forehand into the turn, while keeping light contact, and your outside rein prevents your horse from moving forwards when you apply the leg aids and controls the amount of bend in his neck, as well as preventing his shoulder from falling outwards. HT

THE FIRST STEP OF THE 2008 WORLD CUP SERIES OF THE MODERN PENTATHLON WAS HELD IN THE EGYPTIAN CAPITAL CAIRO FROM FEBRUARY 19TH UNTIL THE 24TH.

DR. H.C. KLAUS SCHORMANN

President of the UIMP (Union Internationale de Pentathlon Moderne):

"The championships which are taking place prior to the road to the 2008 Beijing Olympics have been a success for the international union; we have plenty of athletes competing and the 2 qualification days have shown how well they are prepared to start on a very high level fighting for the World & Olympic qualification rankings. It was a huge challenge for the organisers to accurately hold these championships because they knew the top athletes were coming. The challenge was fulfilled by holding the 5 disciplines in this huge Cairo stadium; the hassle of transportation was out of the way – Cairo is loaded with traffic and having all the games in one location was an added value, the conditions were excellent since it's the winter season, and the Holiday Inn was very close where the athletes were very well accommodated.

The athletes in general are very close to each other and managed to go through the difficulty of the games, and they knew that anyone could win. The pentathlon games are on a very high level that only the strongest athletes have a chance to be World Ranked.

On the equestrian level, the horses were well prepared and selected which is a huge key for good results. The athletes are well aware that if they did not train for riding as much as they would train for swimming for instance, they would not achieve good results which in return add to their points. The horse is our "soul" in sports I always say, and those athletes do not own or know these horses, but they eventually had to work together to achieve the best results; one can be very limited at teaching the horse – the rider has to come to the horse, feel his skin and listen to him. In all, the show was organised very well, quality horses were there for riding, the footing was excellent and excellent results are expected from the athletes. Furthermore, I expected better results from the women because they typically do not play with their muscles, but with harmony".







MR. JOEL BAUZOU

Secretary General of the UIPM:

"The show was well organised with a huge audience, and the competition levels were very high. A lot of riders came here to try to qualify for the Olympics, and all together it has been very nice. There is excellent potential in the future for these championships to develop further because we have more athletes coming to compete this year, and they all compete as a family which shows that new blood is impending".

"It's been a great success! The organisers and the athletes had nothing to complain about; not on the personal level nor on the technical one. 150 riders from 30 countries participated in the show, and 20 of them qualified for the Beijing Olympics. It was a huge achievement.

As for the equestrian event, the grounds were excellently prepared and quality horses were available. All 36 competitors were informed well about how they will be required to highly concentrate due to them sharing horses with other riders, and for every 7 horses, there was one reserve. Those horses were unfamiliar to the riders and vice versa; they were only allowed 5 jumps, hence extreme concentration was requisite. The riders had to understand the horses in a short period of time, were expected to lead them, and on top – the riders had to be controlled and balanced. In general, the pentathlon event is no easy task, and again, I have to say it was a successful and entertaining show".

THE HORSE INDUSTRY IN CHINA

Performance Sales International (PSI) is a German based company owned by Ullrich Kasselmann and Paul Schockemohle; equestrian experts who have founded this establishment to furnish young ambitious riders with talented horses from the best blood lines.

Established in 1980 the company's visionary concept was to provide ready trained Grand Prix dressage and show jumping horses to the demands of the market. Under the umbrella of PSI are the Ullrich Kasselmann Stables and the Paul Schockemohle Yards.

"From uncut rough diamonds to Grand Prix winners" is what the Kasselmann stables promise to give to their dressage horse seeking clients. Offering training for over one-hundred and eighty horses a day, the Kasselmann stables are keen to provide the best care for the horse and best quality for the rider.

The second arm of PSI is Paul Schockemohle, a name and a trademark

which represents a guarantee for success in international show jumping. The Champion himself makes Champions in the sport and supplies highly successful show jumping horses from his yard.

About their presence in the Chinese market, Khaled Assem, Chairman of Horse Times interviewed Arno Neessen - PSI international trainer for show jumping and dressage who confirmed that the PSI activities started in China during the World Challenge Qualifier in Mohan in 2003. Establishing a contact with Clearwood studs Manager of Beijing - Mr. Neessen adds "we reached a partnership agreement between PSI and Clearwood Studs in Beijing. It has been a continuous effort and both sides are happy with the success so far."

What are your views regarding how PSI started and what it represents?

PSI was founded in 1980. Both Schockemohle and Kasselmann took their horses to the USA where they held their

first sales in an auction which proved to be of great success. In 1982 they decided to organise the same sale in Germany and it's been going on ever since. Besides that sale, PSI has created lots of other activities such as the Riders Tour in Munich and the Camel & Equestrian show in Oman in 2006 with two-hundred horses, 600 camels and up to 2.000 attendants which was incredible.

How do you see the relationship between PSI and Clearwood Studs developing in the near and far future - especially with the Olympic Games coming up soon?

Primarily, the equestrian sport in China has to develop; Clearwood is one of the farms that has fantastic facilities and are interested in making a big name for themselves here in China. The sport is new in China and it takes a lot of effort to develop such a sport in a country with no equestrian background. Having said so, they will have a participant in the Olympics which is excellent news.

When you speak of a partnership between Clearwood Stud and PSI, do you also take part in providing advice regarding their footings, their breeding and all the management and good upkeep of horses?

We do actually. Some of their riders come to Europe where they train. All the essential factors of keeping horses fit are available and they are acquiring the knowledge. Over the last four years I have seen the facilities in China hugely develop. But the issue is not really about how to keep a horse, it's all about learning how

to create horsemanship. The Chinese are extremely hard workers and they are progressing. They still have to work harder on providing services though.

It seems that Clearwood Stud is going to be a sample in Beijing of what a complete and full rounded club would look like. Are there any other partnerships with any other clubs in Beijing or with any other club anywhere else in the world - or is this the first big partnership?

We have no other partnerships but both the Chinese and Europeans in general are interested in developing more partnerships in the future.

In the course of the support of PSI to Clearwood Studs, how many times do you visit?

I visit six times a year for three weeks. I stay in touch with the riders and follow all the necessary arrangements. We are currently working on having someone stay permanently for supervision purposes, in particularly a trainer.

How often do the Chinese riders go to Germany?

They usually come in December and stay for three months. They compete a little and perform other tasks in order to gain more experience. HT

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






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




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THE HORSE'S DEVELOPMENT:

A horse is usually fully grown by the time it is four or five years old. At the age of three to three and a half, it can be backed over a period of a few weeks then turned away for several months to mature. Training can then recommence at three and a half to four years of age. In order to avoid harming the horse physically and mentally, the trainer and rider need to have, as well as the necessary riding skills, a basic understanding of animal psychology. Horses are easily upset by incorrect riding, and it can take months, or often even years, to rectify the damage. Bad training can also lead to premature wear and injury, especially to the limbs and mind!

PSYCHOLOGICAL GUIDELINES:

1. Physically and by nature, the horse is a highly specialised creature of flight; it is also a herd animal and feels safest when surrounded by its fellows.

- 2. The horse sees man as one of its fellows; and as the horse's teacher, man needs to take the place of a horse higher in the hierarchy or 'pecking order'. This is achieved through understanding, not forcing when the horse makes mistakes, i.e. does not respond as required to the trainer's instructions, this is only because it has not understood correctly.
- 3. To be able to understand the trainer, the horse needs to **trust** him understanding is based on trust.
- 4. Man, i.e. the trainer, communicates with the horse through the aids and the auxiliary aids, i.e. the voice, touch, weight and reward.
- 5. The horse will only understand the rider's instructions properly if it understands the aids; the horse's primitive, instinctive reaction is to run away from strange or unknown objects and situations and so the horse needs to be acquainted with them gradually and systematically. If fear or uncertainty arises, the trainer should go back and start again; he should also bear in mind that the horse has an excellent **memory**; it remembers the good

things and the bad things which happen to it, and it can take a long time for it to forget a bad experience.

- 6. The horse's ability to learn depends on it being sufficiently mature physically and mentally making excessive physical or mental demands will cause setbacks in the horse's training.
- 7. The horse will achieve its full potential only if its needs are fulfilled and if it is in harmony with its environment of which man is a part.
- 8. The horse must associate man with **security**, in every situation.
- 9. Remember that horses get bored sometimes; dressage horses need to jump, jumpers need to go out hacking while eventers need to swim!

HORSE SENSES AND BEHAVIOUR:

The trainer must understand the role of the horse's senses.

Smell is the most highly developed of the horse's senses although it is not of much help in training. It does, however, exercise a negative influence at times, for example, when the horse reacts to smell it does not like (e.g. a pig farm) or which brings back unpleasant memories (smoke or the smell of chemicals or drugs).

The horse's **hearing** is also highly developed. It is for this reason that unnecessary loud noises should be avoided in the stable and during training.


The horse's **sight** is not very well developed. However, owing to the position of the eyes on the side of the head, the horse has a much wider field of vision than man, i.e. than its rider.


The horse has an exceptional ability to perceive movement, particularly to the side and in the distance. It will see something moving sooner and more clearly than its rider does so that the rider often has no idea why the horse has suddenly shied. The horse's sense of touch and its sensitivity to touch are highly developed. It is this sensitivity which allows the rider to fine-tune his aids. Observing the horse's eyes, ears, tail and breathing, and watching the skin for signs of sweating, will give the trainer an insight into the horse's mental state. The eyes reflect the horse's state of mind. They can express attentiveness, confidence, mistrust or fear. The ear movements can also provide important information about the horse's emotional state. Laid-back or flattened ears always indicate that the horse is at ease and ready

to defend itself. Mobile or pricked ears denote attentiveness and a willing attitude. **Snorting** or 'sneezing', in conjunction with a swinging, freely carried tail, indicate that the horse is free from tension, and is working or ready to work. A tail which is tensed, clamped down or carried high is a sign of fear, tension or excitement. Sweating can be caused not only by exertion but by excitement. It is usually accompanied by raised heart and respiration rates.

THE TRAINER'S PART:

The most important qualities required in a trainer are understanding, sensitivity, calmness and consistency. Nervous, highly strung people are usually impatient and do not have the necessary calm, objective approach. Conscientious repetition of practices necessary for safe handling of the horse, such as tying it up, lifting up

the feet, leading and making it stand, will help to establish a habit of obedience in the horse. Rewarding, scolding, and the appropriate punishment when necessary, should be related directly to what has happened, or what it is hoped to achieve. Constantly feeding the horse sugar, carrots or other titbits for no particular reason will spoil it and eventually lead it to try to place itself above the trainer in the 'pecking order'. Unreasonable or excessive punishment, on the other hand, will lead to resistance, and may ultimately make the horse vicious and dangerous. In training horses, it is a big mistake to expect the horse's reactions to be based on thought processes similar to those of a human. Horses, like all animals, will always act in accordance with primitive, inherited reflexes. HT
