L'ANNEE HIPPIQUE AWARDS 2003

Ludger Beerbaum, Ulla Salzgeber and Pippa Funnell have been awarded Rider of the Year honours in the 2003 edition of Horse International's sister publication the equestrian yearbook L'Année Hippique. The three riders were due to receive their awards during Jumping Indoor Maastricht, 11-14 December

In the annual Best Events dressage riders voted for their favourite events in


2002-2003. Aachen won both categories. Fourteen out of the 16 drivers surveyed chose Aachen CAIO as their preferred event, giving it a massive 77 points. Donaueschingen was runner-up with 38 points ahead of Breda (31), Riesenbeck (20) and Beekbergen (19). For the first time the leading four in hand drivers were asked to select their top indoor show following the first two seasons of the World Cup. Stockholm was voted best with 31 points, ahead of Stuttgart (27), Vigo (21), and s'Hertogenbosch (20).

Five of the 13 dressage riders who participated in the survey placed Aachen CDIO in first place, which gave Aachen 36 points. Stuttgart again had to settle for second place overall although it was the top rated indoor show.


CSI-W GENEVA: CARNUTE WINS

A capacity crowd enjoyed the third annual Top-Ten Final in the Palexpo Arena in Geneva on the Saturday when Rodrigo Pessoa claimed the 36,000 CHF first prize riding the stallion Baloubet du Rouet. The Brazilian rider, who placed ninth in 2001 and seventh last year, said "it's a unique

> competition, my horse jumped very well in both rounds and I am very happy to win it."



For the home crowd there was huge disappointment when World No. 1, Markus Fuchs, was forced to retire in the opening round. Fuchs has been bothered by a thigh-muscle problem since mid-summer and was feeling uncomfortable going into the ring with Tinka's Boy. After jumping a few fences however the pain increased dramatically and he pulled up and left the arena.

The World Cup qualifier was won by Danish Thomas Velin with Equest Carnute. He was right to be determined because Whitaker produced a stunning round from the mare Fleur who stopped the clock in 40.76 seconds but the British partnership had to settle for fifth position when lowering one fence while Becker and Dobel's Cento were more than a second slower than Velin to take runner-up spot ahead of Wylde who finished third.

CSI MAASTRICHT: US LADIES GO DUTCH

Jumping Indoor Maastricht has a reputation for innovation. Through the years many new initiatives were developed in Maastricht, of which many found their way to other European shows. This time an Indoor Derby was staged, with part of the course outside the main arena. Because of the long distances the course could be ridden at pace, which made the competition even more exciting. The Derby had a Dutch winner in Willem Greve, a pupil of Henk Nooren's. Greve rode his Dutch stallion Karandasj (by Fedor) so fast that he could even afford a jumping fault. American riders with KWPN horses dominated the Grand Prix at Jumping Indoor Maastricht (JIM) just before Christmas watched by a capacity crowd. In a thrilling jump-off Beezie Madden with Guidam-son Authentic beat her compatriot Schuyler Riley with Ilian (by Zuidhorn) by less than two tenths of a second.

Sixteen horses out of a starting field of 45 were faultless in the first round. The course built by Frank Rothenberger in the octagonal arena looked to be quite difficult, with short distances between fences, but as the competition progressed it soon became apparent that clear rounds were possible.

First to go in the jump-off, Jos Lansink was clear with Zandor Z, but his time was immediately bettered by young Dutch rider Leopold van Asten and he was not going to be the only one. Schuyler Riley was the first to take the fast route. The American, who now trains with the Pessoas in Brussels, steered Ilian across the finish at a wicked pace and it looked as if she was going to win the Audi A4. But Beezie Madden had other plans. She took the same route, but was just a bit sharper and faster with Authentic. Third place went to Belgium's Ludo Philippaerts with the BWP stallion Parco (by Darco), followed by Olympic Champions, Jeroen Dubbeldam and De Sjiem.

The World Cup Dressage qualifier was won by Heike Kemmer ahead of Dutch Olympic champion Anky van Grunsven with her new ride Gestion Salinero.



POETIN **SOLD FOR** 2.5M **EUROS**

A RECORD 2.5million euros was paid to secure the services of six-year-old World Young Horse dressage champion Poetin

when the Brandenburg mare was auctioned at the 2003 Performance Sales International (PSI) at Ankum, Germany in December. The annual sale is well known for the fantastic prices achieved for up and coming stars but Poetin (by Schockemohle's stallion Sandro Hit) stood out on her own with none of the other 51 lots reaching anything like the money Dutch Peter and Patty van der Zwan paid for her.

GOOD CHEER FOR BENGTSSON IN MECHELEN

Sweden's Rolf-Göran Bengtsson headed the line-up at the seventh leg of the FEI World Cup Jumping series in Mechelen, Belgium (26-30 December) when steering MacKinley to victory in the Land Rover Grand Prix. Course designer Lucien Somers set them a tough test over his 13-fence track and Rolf-Göran said, "the oxers were big and wide with some tricky distances so it was quite difficult in the first round."

Second to go in the opening round, Maurice Van Roosbroeck and Le Coup C set the arena alight when recording a clear for the home audience but another 11 horses jumped before Hubert Bourdy followed suit for France. It looked like it might just be a two-horse race until, with just four left to jump, Dirk Demecrsman and Jos Lansink strengthened the home advantage with two more clear performances and Bengtsson then rounded the number into the jump-off to five with a foot-perfect run. First to go Van Roosbroeck decided to go for a slow clear but lowered a

First to go Van Roosbroeck decided to go for a slow clear but lowered a fence and collected three time penalties. Hubert Bourdy also left the door open with a beatable 45.29 seconds. The crowd grew excited as Demeersman steered Clinton home for Belgium in 42.74 seconds to take the lead and when Jos Lansink and AK Zandor Z shaved almost a full second off that target a home win looked very likely indeed, but Bengtsson had other ideas. "I knew Jos and Dirk were really fast and I didn't know if I could be quicker but I decided to give it a try and I think I took a stride out to the second fence - I was a bit lucky when the horse stumbled but he always tries to give his best every time and we recovered," said the 41-year old-rider.

BEERBAUM CLAIMS THIRD CLASSIC

On the last weekend of January the CSI of Zurich took place for the 14th time. This edition's highlights included Ludger Beerbaum's wins in the Mercedes Swiss Master and Swiss Life Classic with Goldfever and Marcus Ehning's victories in the Credit Suisse Grand Prix with For Pleasure and in the Swiss Life Challenge, the 'champions' competition with change of horses. Ludger Beerbaum is the first rider ever to win Zurich's focal competition, the Swiss Life Classic, three times. Previously he won the class with Goldfever in 2001 and 2002.

DUTCH HEROINE WINS SIXTH TITLE MARCUS AND MOLTEX IN FINE FORM

Dutch dressage riders reigned supreme at the 19th FEI World Cup Dressage Final presented by YORN in Düsseldorf. For the sixth time Dutch heroine Anky van Grunsven won the World Cup Dressage title with Gestion Salinero. Runner-up was her pupil Edward Gal with the stallion Gestion Lingh. Best German combination was Hubertus Schmidt, who finished in third place with his mare Wansuela Suerte. Düsseldorf was not only the venue for dressage's indoor championship it was also host to international show jumping during its four days. Saturday saw the final of the Moltex Öko Team Trophy, which had five teams going after the last points on offer in the three show series (Leipzig, Dortmund, Düsseldorf). Rather handily for the sponsor, the Moltex Team of Meredith and Markus Beerbaum, Marc Wirths and Lars Nieberg, the leaders going into the final, ran clean off with the Trophy recording zero penalties in the process.

On Sunday afternoon, after the conclusion of the World Cup Dressage Final, the show jumpers again took centre stage to vie for the Aegon Grand Prix of Düsseldorf. Only four combinations managed to come home clean over Frank Rothenberger's first round course although 15 suffered the luckless ignominy of just four faults, including Toni Hassmann (Camirez B), Leopold van Asten (VDL Groep Think Twice II), Jessica Kürten (Castle Forbes Maike), Franke Sloothaak (Sundance K) and Peter Wylde (Lauriston). Marcus Ehning and the Oldenburg stallion Sandro Boy flew round the jump-off in 30.87 seconds to secure the first prize of 12,500 euros and a MoneyMaxx savings account worth 10,000 euro. Also clear but .41 seconds off the winning pace for second place was Hauke Luther and the 10-year-old Holsteiner mare Index. Pia-Luise Aufrecht had a single mistake with Hofgut Liederbach's grey stallion Ingmar for third place while eight faults relegated Marc Wirths and Montedan to fourth.

Ina in OSNABRUCKER

he word "Osnabrucker" is a tongue twister in itself for many foreigners, let alone the name of its region, "Das Osnabucker Land" ... inspite of all that, this region offers sweet delights to a horse lover.

Osnabruck is the third largest city of the State of Lower Saxony in the north of Germany. Osnabruck is known as the city of peace: here and in its better known sister city "Munster" the peace treaty of Westphalia was signed in 1648, which brought an end to 30 years of war between Catholics and Protestants in the heart of Europe. Last year Osnabruck was officially announced to be the city in Germany with the 'happiest' citizens, which means a lot in a country that is known to be critical about itself.

The region is three times the size of the metropolis in New York but with a population of only half a million. It's only 90 Km away from the neighboring Netherlands and is known for its beautiful scenery: forests, mountains, lakes, endless fields, and especially the summer's wonderful blooming meadows. Summer is also the best time to see many horses outdoor that call this place their home. The Osnabrucker Land belongs to the famous breeding area of the Hanoverian horse, which is supported, organized, and carefully watched over by the Hanoverian Breeding Association. As you travel across the land you pass by many farms with the famous double horse sign on the front door. Moreover, the likewise famous breeding area of the Oldenburg Horse is just around the corner in the neighboring region with its association that numbers some 5500 active registered breeders.

The biggest breeder, trainer, and seller of horses and certainly also one of the most distinguished names in horse dealing throughout Germany and beyond is to be found in the very north of the Osnabrucker Land: Heinrich Ramsbrock and his famous Ramsbrock Stables. The list of successful horses that have come out of his stables are endless as well as the prizes and honors that Ramsbrock Stables and foremost the man behind all the successes, Heinrich Ramsbrock, achieved. In the year 2000 Ramsbrock received special honors from the Chancellor of the Federal Republic of Germany, Gerhard Schroder, for his outstanding achievements as entrepreneur.

Leaving the very north of the region for the south part of it, you soon come to the grounds of another star that is rising in the Olympus of elite international horse jumping riders: Heinrich-Hermann Engeman. Engeman, aged forty four, is number eighty eight on the current FEI/ Gandini/ World Ranking List. The latter puts him ahead of long known names such as Markus Beerbaum (no.131) the younger brother of no. 1 Ludger Beerbaum, Marcus Merschformann (no.148), Thomas Schepers (no.160), Massimo Grossato (no.123), and Andre Sakakini (no.245). Moreover, Engelmann hit the headlines when he achieved the one hundred victory in S-Class (highest class) jumping together with his own trained Westphalia mare "Candela"; that result was stated to be a world record. Engeman runs together with his wife Karin Ernsting - Engeman (a likewise professional and very successful rider) a riding ground, where promising horses and promising skilled riders receive training and education.

Engeman and his wife organized and hosted in May this year the first Jumping-Derby in the Osnabrucker Land on their own ground. The idea of a Derby was first presented and then supported by Paul Schockemohle and Derby Chief Volker Wulff. The Derby was highly praised by both riders and audience. The course built by Frank Rothenberger was challenging to both horse and rider. The winner of the Derby in clear rounds was Heiko Schmidt from Mecklenburg (in the east of Germany) on his 11 year gelding "Ussul". This victory qualifies him together with Siegmar Stroehmer (second place) and Tim Rieskamp-Goedeking (third place) to participate in the famous Derby in Hamburg that is due just a few weeks later (20-23 May) in which the international elite riders will resume again amongst them Ludger Beerbaum, Marcus Ehning, Markus Fuchs, and Rodrigo Pessoa, Gilbert Bockmann from Lastrup came fourth in the Osnabrucker Land Derby followed by renowned Alois Pollmann-Schweckhort on Montanus Faro, Marc Bettinger came sixth, Holger Wulschner, the winner of the Hamburg Derby 2000, took seventh and the well-known Rene Tebbel ninth place.

The Derby in the Osnabrucker Land, which was considered to be the best preparation for the Derby in Hamburg, "will take place again next year", according to Engeman, thanks to a great sponsor who wishes to remain unknown.

There is even much more to say about Osnabruck and its region "Das Osnabrucker Land", but maybe you would like to see some of that yourself...

anfoods hosted a press conference on Sunday 7th of March, in McDonald's "Merghany" on the occasion of signing a contract with Andre Sakakini. They agreed to sponsor Sakakini in the upcoming Olympics held in Athens on August 2004. The key speakers were Andre Sakakini, Mohamed Mansour (Vice President of Manfoods Company), and Caroline Greiss, Senior Marketing Manager of McDonald's. The conference was attended by a lot of journalists and was covered by the Nile Sports satellite channel.

Asking Mansour on the budget they specified for this sponsoring plan he said; "We don't have a specific budget for it, the budget will be whatever Andre spends during this period".

Sakakini's program for the Olympics starts on April. He has a brief tour of competitions in some of the European countries. He is then planning to go directly back to Germany since his horses should be traveling on the 17th of August on the last plane with the Dutch team. It definitely takes a lot of work, money, and efforts to pass the qualifications and to earn your tickets to Athens- to the Olympic Games. Still, according to Sakakini "the problem is that, we can't promise you medals in horse back riding, because it is not in my hands alone, there is an animal involved. So you can come as far as the final day and things could change with the horse. Since we entered the qualifications and actually passed them, this obliges us to go, try, do our best and if everything goes well we could earn a medal".

This would be the forth time for Sakakini to participate in the Olympics. His main sponsors in this Olympics, beside Manfoods, will be the Ministry of Youth and Sports, and he is still negotiating a deal with another Italian company.

Mohamed Mansour, Vice President of Manfoods Egypt

The Minister of Youth and Sports, Dr. Aley El Din Helal never hesitates to help horseback riders in Egypt. "In the last three years he did a lot for the equestrian community, he supported the talented young riders, and he helped me a lot too" Sakakini stated.

Sakakini owns thirteen horses in Germany; four of them are competing internationally, and are all representing Egypt. One of them "Casper" is owned by the Ministry of Youth and Sports. Two of these horses, including Casper, where qualified for the Olympics. The Minister, Dr. Helal, was the one who gave Sakakini the funds required to buy Casper three years ago. After the problems Sakakini faced in the Olympics held in Sydney four years ago, he talked with Dr. Helal and convinced him to buy a young horse to be trained for this year's Olympics. Dr. Helal did not hesitate in helping him and they bought Casper for sixty thousand U.S dollars.

During the Olympics held in Sydney, Sakakini was sponsored by Sheikh Fahd Zahed_from Saudi Arabia, who has been a lot of support for him. Unfortunately just before this Olympics started Sakakini faced a setback with the horse he was supposed to ride. And he entered the Olympics on a young horse called "Careful", who was only nine years old. Sakakini did not plan to win a medal in Sydney because he was professional enough to know that his horse was too young for this kind of competition. However, Sakakini and Careful went all the way to the finals but "the last round was extra hard for the horse, I don't mean Physically but Psychologically," Sakakini said.

As for the qualifications for this year's Olympics; Egypt sent a team to compete in these qualifications. It was composed of Sakakini, Karim Al-Zoghby, Sameh Hattab, and Alaa Maysara. They all entered as a team but unfortunately they didn't qualify. However, still Egypt was fortunate enough that Sakakini qualified individually. The other qualified riders were two from Saudi Arabia, one from Japan, and one from New Zealand. As for the teams, the qualified ones were from Korea, Japan, and New Zealand.

Sakakini believes that there is lot of very talented riders in Egypt; "They are all very good riders but the problem is that; they have a lot of outside burdens like their education and work, while show jumping is very time consuming," Sakakini stated. He also thinks that the Egyptian Equestrian Federation should develop a special office that works as a mediating body between the sponsors and riders. This office's main responsibility would be "marketing the sport" and helping the skilled riders get more funds and advance more.

Sakakini initially developed an interest in show jumping at the early age of 10 while still residing in his home country Egypt, and rapidly progressed to develop and perfect the skills of showmanship to participate in international shows by the age of 28. His latest achievements were winning second place in the Grand Prix of Spangenberg, Germany, and winning first place in the Grand Prix of

Donaueschingen, Germany in the year 2000. We all wish him the best of luck in the upcoming Olympics.

We would also like to take this chance and thank Manfoods-McDonald's and Mr. Mohamed Mansour, for their most appreciated contribution to the Equestrian world in Egypt, signified in their sponsoring of Egypt's celebrated rider, Andre Sakakini.

Manfoods has a very influential role in the sports industry in Egypt. In the year 2003 they sponsored a lot of football tournaments, like the Gezira Sporting club tournament, and the Shooting club tournament during Ramadan, plus sponsoring Shooting club's junior football team. That's beside their agreement with the Egyptian Weight Lifting Federation to sponsor the Egyptian national Weight lifting team in the upcoming Olympics.

Furthermore, Mohamed Mansour, Manfood's Vice President, is also one of the important members of the Egyptian equestrian society. In show jumping, Mansour's latest accomplishments were winning third place in season 2001 - 2002 National Championship "C" class, and Fifth place in the 9th International Movenpick Championship. He is currently competing in the A2 and B classes, and he is qualified for the A2 national finals in April. Mansour also participated in a lot of international shows; to name a few: "Basel El-Asad" Horse Riding

Championship in Syria, and "Princess Alia" Championship in Jordan. Mansour felt very positive about Sakakini's achievements and expected that he would "perform very well" in the Olympics.

As for Sakakini's upcoming schedule in preparation for the Olympics; It includes the following tour: Manheim (May 1st), Aach (May13th), Hamburg (May 20th), Wisbaden (May 28th), Rotterdam (June 16th), Hachenburg (July 1st), Reolefin (July 8th), Spangenberg (July 22nd), and Gera (July 29th).

Beside winning the trials of the Olympic qualifications in Aachen last year, Sakakini won approximately 30 competitions and tournaments sponsored by internationally acclaimed companies in Italy, France, England, Sweden, Belgium, and Germany

dding to the Egyptian world wide successes in show jumping; Alaa Maysara won the grand prix in Syria competing with riders from Lebanon, Jordan, Holland, and Syria. Reflections by General Ahmed El Sawaf

eneral Ahmed El Sawaf was classified second in the A1 class during this year's national show jumping season. Asking General Sawaf on his secret of success he said "despite being very occupied at work I manage to ride everyday. I believe that the vital elements in being successful in show jumping, especially at an age like mine, rest in three points:

1.Experience: I managed my horse very well, competed in just enough shows to be qualified. Also I kept my horse always in a good physical condition and made sure that he gave me his full output just at the finals. This kind of management comes with the experience of knowing your horse and knowing when and how to use him.

2.Physical fitness: I believe it is related to the sport that one practices. For show jumping, fitness is a lot of riding and a lot of stretching.

3.Training and practicing: I keep my horse exposed to all the technical difficulties that I know and the new ones that I learn. In every show there is a new experience. I try to stimulate this at home in my training and gradually raise the level of difficulty in order not to shock my horse.

Furthermore, General Sawaf gave us his sentiments regarding two future wishes. First he would appreciate if the federation considers allowing all riders to compete in international events at their own expense so as to improve the level of performance and the level of experience in shows; not only the Army and the Police.

In addition, General Sawaf hopes to qualify for the team that will represent Egypt in the next Mediterranean Games, as strategically such a team will need an element of experience not just as a rider but a team leader; an element that gives psychological stability to the whole team. That showed in the Last day of qualifications for the finals, when his daughter Nahla El Sawaf, saw him jump a clear round, she felt confident that she performed just as good as he did.

Finally, General Sawaf was very satisfied with the performance of his horse "MeshMesh Z" which he bought from Arno Neessen, who was also the supplier of the mare "Carta". Carta won first place in the A1 class-national competition, as well as the Grand Prix of Syria. Good Luck to General Sawaf and cheers for Arno Neesen as the supplier of excellent show jumping horses for the police force

One national competition has ended another one has begun and ended; almost the same arenas and participants in each season. DON'T get me wrong; I still strongly believe that the competition season is probably the highlight of the year for all of us, horse fanatics. 
Sixty one riders from eighteen nations participated in this spectacular three-day event. It was held under the patronage of the Ministry of Interior Affairs, Ministry of Tourism, and Ministry of Youth and Sports; and was organized under the auspices of the Egyptian Equestrian Federation (EEF) and the Police Sports Union. The event was preceded by two days of choosing and training the horses in the police academy. Each f the three competition days hosted a different form of competition with a different set of rules and regulations.

The first class was held on Monday 12th of January 2004, this class was only one round against the clock with a maximum height of 125 cm and a speed of 350m/min. The second and third classes were held on Thursday 15th and Friday 16th of January respectively.

The second class was the very much-awaited for The Grand Prix competition; participants competed over two non-identical rounds where only the second round was against the clock. Its maximum height was 135cm and a speed of 375m/min.

The third class held on the last day, was the Mixed Teams competition. Each team consisted of 4 riders, competing in. two identical rounds plus one jump off against the clock for first place. The class was of maximum height 125 cm and a speed of 350m/min.

The number of audience on each and every day of the event was very impressive (especially during the weekend). International Coverage:

Summarized impressions from the World Wide Web. If you take a glance through the internet and feed the world's largest internet search machine "google" with keywords such as CSI Cairo, Movenpick Show,... etc., you find yourself connected to websites stretching from Europe to Asia. Amongst these are professional as well as non-professional horse-riding sites and even several tourist sites that advise travellers to Egypt well in advance of the event to take opportunity to watch the tournament at the Moevenpick Hotel in Heliopolis from 12-16 January 2004.

Admittedly most of the sites covering the topic are German horse-riding sites, just to mention two: the site of Reiter Revue, one of the best known magazines on equestrian sport in Germany and horseweb.de, a large established information resource for internet users all about horses.

Most of the published articles covering the competition range from neutral to positive; mainly the event itself is mentioned and the results are presented. However one could gather from many of the articles an undertone that gives the whole event an exotic touch, as if to imply that the Egyptian professional riding scene has been out of close international watch for quite a while and presents itself to the outside world surprisingly well. Numerous articles report that the FEI-General Secretary Dr. Bo Helander praised the perfect organisation of the event and expressed his respect for the level of the Egyptian riders and their horses. The German sites focus on the results of the German riders mentioning Jutta Wiesner as the cousin of Heinrich-Hermann Engemann, who obtained the best position among German participants in the mixed team competition, her team taking 4th place. Nonetheless the team competition was won by a team of three Egyptian riders and the Italian rider Massimo Grossato. As for the results of the Grand Prix the President of the Egyptian Equestrian Federation Abd el Fatah Ragab expressed his happiness that it had been a great day for the Egyptian riding sport: the Egyptian Karim el Sobky won on the 8 year old gelding 'Le Gatte' before the Belgian F. Mathy on the 10 year old gelding 'Darios'. Special attention is given in German articles to André Sakkakini, who is described at the local matador with residence in Germany, well known to the German professional riding scene, and who qualified already for the Olympics in Athens for his country Egypt. He was edged out this time on the first day by the 32 year old Dutch rider Marcel Groen who took first place riding the 11 year old Dutch mare 'Watch Out' just before André Sakkakini on 'Leonardo', a Holsteiner gelding. One critical voice also stemming from Germany more or less ascertained that while Egyptian came out ahead of that competition, a considerable number of well known and experienced foreign riders could not cope well with the horses provided for them. However the same article proceeds by noting that Egypt is not unknown in the field of high level horse jumping, taking 4th place in the Olympics in Rome (1960), and that Micky Brinckmann (cavalry captain), still admired in Egypt, had felt so wonderful about that country

Interviewing Arno Neessen

HORSE Times (H.T): Mr. Arno how long has been since you first came to this country? Which year was it?

Arno Neesen (A.N): That was on the Movenpick show in 95, exactly 9 years ago. During that show I got in contact with Mr. Abd El Fatah Ragab, and they asked me to come over to do a clinic here which has been repeated several times and on regular basics up till now in 2004.

H.T: So you have actually visited this country maybe once or more that once yearly!

A.N: Definitely more that once yearly, I think five to six times per year.

H.T: Well, in your opinion sir, as you have seen this sport develop and grow, what are the positive changes that you have seen, as we all do know that you have won lots and lots of shows in this country and that you are one of the people who could detect positive points and negative ones, what do you think are the positive changes that happened lately in Egypt?

A.N: Of course, creating new facilities for organizing shows, big space, good service, that most of the shows are going to be held on these facilities, and that goes step by step, but it's more than 100% progress compared to ten or nine years ago. Also the qualities of the horses imported to Egypt has tremendously changed, people are more alert on having the quality not the quantity as well as critical of what they are buying.

H.T: I do know sir, that you are part of the improvement of bringing in better quality horses to Egypt. But as you have said horses are part of it, clubs and facilities are part of it, what have you noticed regarding grooming conditions, shoeing, feeding, and the elements that are necessary for the horse to be well nourished?

A.N: Everybody tries everything possible. I know that in a country like Egypt, not everything you need is available most of the tools has to be imported which takes time, sometimes its quiet complicated.

Shoeing also is improving; bringing in a Farrier from abroad, every now and then, to teach the local Farriers; it all made sense and it all worked well at the end for better results. This also made the horses last longer because "the horse shoe is the basis of the horse, the foundation of a horse; no foot no horse".

H.T: Now sir as you have pointed out the positive aspects which are all very important elements that do, as you have said, take quiet a while to improve upon, and polish, and practice over several years, what do you think are the negative points that still needs to be improved?

A.N; Going back to horse shows, I would like to see more; although they did split up the competitions into classes, attending the last few shows I discovered that, for instance, the C-level they have to jump all shows over the same course designed for the A1 and A2 levels. The point is that, the A1 and A2 are already to cope with more technical difficulties. I think they should make for the C class a less technical course, because the C class riders are usually either young or inexperienced riders with young horses. And they all deserve to have a fair road to the top to develop themselves positively.

H.T: That also bring us to a very important question, the courses that you have seen built in National competitions, do you think that these are good (qualifier) courses that would bring up a horse to an upper level smoothly and intelligently? Are we similar to the path they have in Europe?

A.N: Definitely the coarse designing is a very important element in the development of a show jumper and I think especially for the younger novice riders, the course should be easier than the courses designed for the more experienced riders and the more experienced horses because you know "the same tracks for these young riders and these young horses, it's in my opinion still too difficult'. The thing is that it's also for the audience; it's more attractive to see riders go over the day successfully, but it would be more enjoyable in a couple of different courses not the same track all day long.

H.T: As you have seen developments go through in the equestrian field in Europe, do you feel that Egypt now is on the right track, or are we missing

anything'

A.N: Well, I think that Egypt is definitely on the right track, they do everything possible to send their selected, talented riders abroad to gain some experience on international shows and that is very positive.

H.T: We are all for sure familiar with your achievements but I would like you to first tell us some of your remarkable achievements as a rider. And then tell us the qualifications of a good trainer because a good rider is not necessarily always a good trainer?

A.N: Well, my highlight in my career actually was when I got the opportunity as a junior rider to have a position in the stables of Mr. Melchior and Zanger Sheide in Belgium. Then the gentlemen sent me to Germany to the top trainer, Herman Schrieder, and that guy who was an Olympic champion from Tokyo made me realize that I understood nothing at all in this sport, starting with schooling a horse basically on the flat. It took me quiet a long time to get that under control and that made me confident. Before that time, before I got that feeling, it was quiet a tough time for me, which made me sometimes think of stopping everything. However, after a year of training with him he brought me to the world championships where I was competing as the youngest competitor in 1974, in which I finished 12th in total and I won a couple of grand prixs. I competed for Holland in around ten nation cups; I also represented

Holland in a lot of international unofficial shows and was quite successful. Until I got a request to be a trainer in Iraq, Paul Schockemohle asked me and I accepted the job, and worked in it for four years. Then training took all my concentration because I liked to do it. I think a good trainer should be around in the world, different countries, different work, different mentalities which help him to be a multifunctional person through dealing with a lot of different mentalities, you have to deal with different cultures, and I think that's very important for any human being's life. I think I have learned a lot from Herman Schieder; he was always explaining to me things with

examples, and I tried to bring it in the practice every way I can.

H.T: You were a very successful rider, a very successful coach, and most of all you have a particular passion for horses; so what would you dream to achieve in the equestrian world?

A.N: What I would like to do is to work around the world, in as much countries as possible, to find talented students and help them choose the right horses so as to produce together successful couples of riders and their horses

Interview with Rob Ehrens Senior A legend on his own... By: Ahmed Talaat

He is Rob Ehrens, the Netherlands legend; he was one of the best riders in the 20th century and one of the best trainers all over the world now. Ehrens senior is the Netherlands young, junior, and pony riding team's trainer. Moreover, he won 35 grand prix competitions like Olympia, Hickstead, and Amsterdam; he also competed in three Olympic Games.

Out of all the important competitions you participated in, which was the most spectacular and unforgettable one?

It was in 1998 when I won the Grand Prix of Hickstead. All of the Top riders and horses participated in the Jump off; John Whitaker on Milton, Pierre Durand on Jappeloup, Nick Skelton on Apollo, Ludger Beerbaum on Land Lord, and Malcom Payrah on Tower Land Anglezarke.

If you have a good quality horse, how long will it take to prepare an internationally competing horse?

It takes a lot of time, because you have to compete in all of the small classes first so as to help the horse gain more experience in all classes. Then you start moving on to the higher classes. However, you have to let this process take enough time because if you tried jumping bigger classes quickly, you could easily loose the horse.

What would be your advice to amateurs who want to improve their riding?

The basics are the most important thing at the beginning. They should get more flat work training, which I think is strong here in Egypt, and give themselves enough time to learn the basics.

If you don't know how to sit in the right way, or you can't work all of the horse's body in flat work, you won't be able to jump.

How do you find Show Jumping here in Egypt?

After a couple of visits to Egypt I could say that I am surprised. There are a lot of good riders here, especially junior riders.

Do you think Egypt have horses that could compete internationally?

In Fact I think you have a shortage in big horses that can jump the 160 classes. You definitely have good riders and they have horses that could jump big classes, but I think this is not enough; they need more horses for higher classes.

What do you think of Egypt's first team? And what would be your advice to them?

In my opinion you have a really good quality of riders here in Egypt. If they continued working hard and had good horses, I think they would be professional enough to compete and actually win in Europe

A "Moon Light" View

"It is the struggle to achieve excellence that makes us the people we are"

As usual we are always on the search for different ways to improve this marvelous sport. For the most part, we are looking for diverse ways of injecting more funds for the riders to keep up with the increased expenses and the vigorous international competition. Getting distinctive ideas from a rider who "finally made it to success"; we asked Mr. Yafie Osman about his suggestions.

Mr. Osman was a Ferousia club show jumping team member for ten years, a Gezirah club team member for one year, and at the age of twenty five he traveled to the United States to start off his 'success story'. In the states he first worked as a catch rider in central New Jersey and eventually took a job as a farm manager and rider. In 1996 Mr. Osman and his wife, Anne, established their own stud farm "Moon Light Farm". Moon Light is a twenty acre Equestrian facility that offers a variety of equestrian services for professional and novice riders. Moon Light includes: large (60 diameter) round pen, large sand ring (100x200 w/excellent footing), lighted indoor arena (60x150), jumping field with natural jumps, grass turnout, and trails on and off property. The farm offers: boarding, training (riders and horses), sales, and shows.


According to Mr. Osman sport's funding can be increased through: "Private sponsoring, advertising and publicity, decreased taxes, and increasing horse shows". For a rider to take show jumping as his only profession and really excel in it, it has to have a good financial reward for him. Not only that, he should also be able to plow back some of the money into the sport to help develop it. Mr. Osman believes that the main problem with the equestrian shows in Egypt is that there are no financial rewards for the riders. While in the States, shows are one of the main ways of bringing in funds into the equestrian sport. Explaining to us how the system works in the Grand Prix shows in the States Mr. Osman said that if all riders pay entry fees that varies from \$100 to \$500, and the Grand Prix is (for example) 10,000, it would be divided upon the first ten riders as follows: " the first would win 3000, second 2000, third 1500, and so on until the total mounts up to 10,000". This way, the riders would have "an adequate" financial reward that would encourage them to compete in more shows, and as a result technically develop their riding skills. Through this the rider's funds, skills, and abilities will increase helping them to start competing internationally.

While competing internationally is every rider's dream, this dream will not come true until riding develops into the rider's only profession. Therefore the federation and all the riding centers should put extra effort into organizing more shows to help increase publicity and funding into the sports.

Devotion is the name of the game; once we get devoted riders, organizers, and trainers, our dreams will start coming true



Mr. Yafei Osman in "Moon Light"



The Joy of ... endurance races in Egypt



The 4th Al-Ahram Endurance Championship


pril 8th - While a second could break a horse's career at Sakkara Country Club, it just meant more waiting in the midday sun for the racers to finish the 4th International Pyramids Endurance competition. Only horse gossip, sand and a slight breeze to contemplate; there certainly were a lot of audience and reporters from all over the Arab world.

The 120 Km race started at 6:00 a.m. to get a jump on the heat, and was divided to five different loops. Five competitors were from Jordan, Four from Emirates, one from Italy, Five from Kuwait, one from Chili, and around thirty four from Egypt. The race was organized by the International Equestrian Federation, the Egyptian Equestrian Federation, and Al-Ahram Al-Araby news paper.

Sheikh Hazaa Bn Zaid Al Nahyan of Abu Dhabi, once again demonstrated his exemplary horsemanship when he steered reflex to victory in this 120 endurance ride on his mare "Mn Yadry". As expected by most of the audience, Sheikh Hazaa won first place followed by two of his own Abu Dhabi's team, Abdullah Khamis Ali, and Adnan Sultan Saif, in the second and third place. This was the Sheikh's forth time to participate in an endurance race in Egypt. His mare 'Mn Yadry' won the Triple Crown competition in Emirates, she also won all the endurance races she entered except one from which she was disqualified as a result of an injury. According to Sheikh Hazaa "endurance horses should get a lot of training and participate in as much races as possible so as to get his mind acquainted with the fact of being patient".

Furthermore, commenting on the race's organization, Mr. Mohamed Rashid Bn Ghedayer, head of Dubai's Endurance Races Committee, "the race is

very well organized, from the minute we set foot in the airport to the race itself, the equipment, and the ushering, it's all up to the highest standards. The Egyptian Equestrian Federation and the International Equestrian Federation, they are all cooperating in the success of the race". Moreover, According to Mr. Rashid, for a horse to win an endurance race he has to have a heart rate of approx. 64 beats / minute or less, a big heart, big lungs, light frames, and thin skin which dissipates heat.

After the end of the race, Eng. Abdel Fatah Ragab, President of the EEF, said "of coarse it was expected that the best rider would be sheikh Hazaa, I expected him to win. As for the Egyptian riders, I expected them to come up 8th & 9th, but they came up 7th & 8th, which is in fact a very good progress". The Egyptian federation has a structured plan for the Egyptian endurance riders. The Federation already appointed a professional French trainer and is planning to get the Egyptian riders qualified for the world championship in 2005 taking place in Dubai

VE Itips

It is important to recognize the signs of good health and to watch for any deviation from them. You will soon learn the characteristics of any horses in your care and will know if all is normal and well with them. The following are indications of good health:

- Standing and behaving normally; a confident and alert look.
- Coat sleek and lying flat.
- "Skin loose and supple to the touch and easily moved over the underlying bones.
- At rest, no visible signs of sweating except in very hot weather.
- Eyes wide-open and bright. When examined, the membranes under the eyelids and linings of the nostrils should be salmon pink in color.
- Eating up well and chewing normaly. "Body well filled out (bone structure well covered) but not gross.
- Limbs free from swellings or heat (cool to the touch).
- Standing evenly on all four feet. Resting a hind leg (but not a foreleg) is quit normal.
- Sound in action; taking strides of equal length.
- Urine fairly thick and either colorless or pale yellow and passed several times a day.
- Droppings, which will vary in color with the diet, passed approximately eight times daily, in the form of damp balls that break on hitting the ground. Their smell should be inoffensive. When the horse is at grass the droppings may be looser but should not be as sloppy as a cow's.
- Respiration (breathing rates) when at rest 8 to 12 inhalations per minute.
- Temperature: 38 ?C
- Pulse: 36 to 42 heart beats per minute

WORKING ON TWO TRACKS

A distinction must be made between the following movements: Leg yielding Shoulder in

Travers

Renvers

Half pass

The aim of movements on two tracks is:


- 1- To improve the obedience of the horse to the co-operative aids to the rider.
- 2. To supple all parts of the horse, thereby increasing the freedom of his shoulders and the suppleness of his quarters, as well as the elasticity of the bond connecting the mouth, the poll, the neck, the back and the haunches.
- 3. To improve the cadence and bring the balance and pace into harmony.
- 4. To develop and increase the engagement of the quarters and thereby also the collection.

Leg Yielding

The horse is almost straight, except for a slight positioning at the poll away from the direction in which he moves, so that the rider is just able to see the eyebrow and nostril on the inside. The inside legs pass and cross in front of the outside legs.

Leg yielding is the most basic of all lateral movements and should be included in the training of the horse before he is ready for collected work. Later on, together with the more advanced movement shoulder-in, it is the best means of making a horse supple, loose and unconstrained, for the benefit of the freedom, elasticity and regularity of his paces and the harmony, lightness and ease of his movements.

Leg yielding can be performed "on the diagonal", in which case the horse should be as nearly as possible parallel to the long sides of the arena, although the forehand should be slightly in advance of the quarters. It can also be performed "along the wall", in which case the horse should be at an angle of about 35 degrees to the direction in which he is moving



The Right... Food

Feed according to work, temperament, and condition

Work

Feed according to the work done and the size of horse or pony. As exercise and work are increased, the diet must be adjusted to produce more energy and to build up muscle.

If work is decreased, or if the horse is laid up through injury or illness, the concentrates must be reduced and the roughage in the diet increased to compensate.

Temperament

All horses are individuals and must be treated as such. Some become excitable on oats and require an alternative form of concentrate. Sluggish horses sometimes benefit from more energy-giving foods to encourage them to be active.

Condition

Whether a horse is stabled and working hard, or resting out at grass, he should be in good condition. If he is not, it may be that he is not receiving the correct amount or type of food, and his diet must be adjusted accordingly. For example, if he is too thin he may need more food or more nutritious diet: and if he is too fat, he may need less.

Other factors which may influence his well-being are:

Age: old and young horses need specialized feeding. Old horses may loose condition easily because they are no longer able to make such good use of food. They may need an increase of cooked or processed concentrates which are easier to digest.

Young horses which are growing may also need more concentrates in a correctly balanced ration. They need more vitamins and minerals than a mature animal.

Brood Mares: Pregnant mares or those feeding a foal at foot (lactation) need extra concentrates. Specially formulated stud cubes contain the extra feed value, vitamins, and minerals.

Type: Horses of the same height and weight do not necessarily thrive on the same diet. For example, horses with thoroughbred or Arab blood may require careful feeding -perhaps a more palatable diet- to maintain condition; whereas native ponies are more accommodating, thrive on bulk feeds (hay or grass), and may easily get laminitis if the diet is too rich.

Climate: A large part of a horse's food is used to maintain body temperature. A horse or pony living out in cold, wet weather will need extra food to maintain condition and keep warm.

Company: Loss of condition could be due to constant bullying by companions, which may impede eating and resting. However, an animal that is used to company may pine and lose condition if suddenly isolated.

Illness: Your vet should advice you with the required special diet. Worms: They are the most likely cause of poor condition.

Stable Vices: Wind sucking and crib-biting can interfere with

digestion. Weaving and bow-walking wastes energy

Show Jumping Phases of the jump - The Horse

Analysis of the Jump:

It is important to understand exactly how a horse jumps. For this reason the jump is here divided into five phases:

1.The Approach

2.The Take-off

3. The Moment of Suspension

4. The Landing

5. The Get-Away (or Recovery)

fullest extent. He rounds his back. The forelegs are tucked up. The hind legs, having left the ground, follow the parabola of the body. If the horse fails to lower his head and neck and hollows or flattens his back, the jump will be inefficient and he will need to make more effort to clear the fence.

Phase 4: The Landing

The horse straightens his forelegs and prepares to meet the ground. He momentarily raises his head to balance himself. His forelegs touch down one after after the other, followed by the hind legs.

His back should remain supple so that his hind legs can move well under him before they touch the ground.

Phase 5: The Get-Away (Recovery)

The get away stride should be fluent, with the horse's hocks coming well underneath him, so that the balance, rhythm and impulsion of the pace are re-established as soon as possible. This is important because the approach to the next fence may have already begun

Phase 2: The Take-off

Before the moment of take-off, the horse lowers his head and stretches his neck, measuring up the fence and preparing for the spring. At the moment of Take-off he shortens his neck slightly, raises his head and lifts his forehead off the ground, immediately bending his knees and folding up his forelegs. He then brings his hocks underneath him and, as his hind feet touch the ground, he stretches his head and neck and uses the power of his headquarters to spring forward and upward.

Phase 3: The Moment of Suspension

While in the air, the horse stretches his head and neck forward and downward to their

Phase 1: The Approach

The horse must be going forward in balance, with impulsion and rhythm. The quality of the jump is closely related to the quality of the pace during the approach. The jump itself depends largely on a correct approach.
